

CORRIGENDUM-1

Global Case Study of Field Hospitals for COVID-19

Reference No: CDRI/02-04001/1/2021-DD_HR-ADMIN (Issued on: 30 June 2021)

With reference to the RFP for the Global Case Study of Field Hospitals for COVID-19, the following changes to the RFP process are appended in this corrigendum.

1. The last date for submission of proposals has been extended till **03 September 2021**, **23:59 HRS (IST)**.

Accordingly, following clauses are revised in Data Sheet II as:

"Proposals must remain valid 90 days after the final submission date. i.e., **03 December 2021.** (Page 16)

"Expected date for commencement of consulting Assignment/job is **17 September 2021.**" (Page 22)

2. In Data Sheet II, Sl No. 15, page 18, second last paragraph is revised as:

Proposals will be submitted via EMAIL to the address as mentioned in the Data Sheet Cl. 5, with subject line: Proposal: "Global Case Study of Field Hospitals [Agency Name]".

- 3. Section I, Clause 12, Page 12, Earnest Money Deposit, stands deleted.
- 4. Under the section on Additional Information on Page 59 of the RFP, point no 4, stands deleted.
- 5. In Data Sheet Point No. 16, table for Evaluation Criteria for Technical Bids, in Consultancy Firm's specific experience, in second row, term 'Not applicable' stands deleted.
- 6. In Section 4.1.2. Sampling Criteria for Case Study, page 46, Table of Sample selection scheme, Asia and Australian Region: '**Bangladesh'** is added.
- 7. In Section 4.1.1. Depth of case study (page 45), Second paragraph, requirements of primary data and field visits are clarified as revised below.

In terms of 'data' collected for the case study, it is expected that study would not rely on just one source of information such as government documents about FHs/ MFHs or press releases. Instead, for four selected FHs and six MFHs, the Agency should design systems to collect and triangulate primary and secondary data from multiple



sources including, but not limited to, visits to Field Hospitals by the Agency's research team or its local partners to make firsthand observations.



8. On page 49-50, in Section 7. Staffing Requirements, Table List of Key experts to work on the project, the minimum experience and qualifications of the key staffs will be read as follows:

2. Health infrastructure experts	Minimum MBBS/Masters	10 years
3. Case study experts	Minimum PhD	10 years
4. Disaster management expert	Minimum Masters	10 years
5. Infrastructure project management experts	Minimum Masters/MBA	7 years
6. Operations management experts	Minimum Masters/MBA	7 years
7. Public administration expert	Minimum Masters/MBA	7 years
